“Living Abundantly through Serving Boldly”

Like many of you, I have spent the last several weeks considering the theme of *Living Abundantly through Serving Boldly*. I am thankful for the team that has been leading us through a season of discernment about the unique gifts God has given to each of us in the community of faith, and I hope that you have taken them up on their invitation to consider how God is calling you to use your gifts in service in, through, and beyond this congregation.

At its heart, the Christian life is about service in the name of Jesus Christ—the way, the truth, and the life. That’s one of the reasons that the earliest Christians were given a rather curious title. They were simply known as *the people of the Way*. It was a way of describing that a disciple’s life is marked not by simply believing in Jesus, but in following his way of self-giving love.

The officers of the church and I have a vision for our congregation. We envision every member being involved in at least one ministry this year. That ministry could be serving our neighbors through the church’s Food Pantry once a month. It could be serving as mentor to one of our Confirmation students. It could be answering the call to be a Shepherd for the Kindergarten Class in our Faith Village, or singing in the choir, or visiting those with special needs. This is what I know: when people put their hands in ministry with others, their hearts will grow and God’s church will flourish as it seeks to give its life in service.

In the next few days, the church will be sending you a Gifts and Talents Inventory. This inventory contains a comprehensive list of discipleship opportunities that are possible through this congregation’s ministry together. On Sunday, May 4, we will offer our commitments by bringing them forward and placing them on the Lord’s Table, just as we did during our annual financial campaign last November. I am convinced that it will be an exciting day of renewed commitment to Christ and his Church, and I hope that you will complete and offer your Gifts and Talents Inventory alongside the other disciples who are part of the MPC family.

In closing, I offer you the following prayer for use in your discernment of God’s call to you:

Almighty God, so draw my heart to you, so guide my mind, so fill my imagination, so control my will, that I may be wholly yours, utterly dedicated to you. Use me as you will, always to your glory, through my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

From the Property Ministry

Well, spring is here and activities around the church are like the bees on the flowering trees. Property Ministry has been busy as well. As I mentioned in my recent Minute for Mission, Jason Fletcher, who has been our grounds keeper for several years, is moving on. I want to thank Jason for his work here and wish him and his family the best of luck.

The position of Grounds Keeper has spoiled us over the years. The time has come for our congregation to be more accountable for our church. In reality, we are all members of the Property Ministry and we need your help.

In addition upkeep of the grounds and chores around the church, Jason setup tables and chairs for various meetings and checked the church at night to turn off lights, turn back the heat, and lock all of the doors. It is important that we all pitch in to fill the void Jason's departure has left.

We have 516 active members here at Massanutten Presbyterian. For years the maintenance and upkeep of our church has been done by less than 3% of our congregation. In the next few weeks the "Time and Talent" survey will be sent to you. Please let us know, in whatever form, you can assist the Property Ministry at the church. We especially need some people who can arrive at the church early on Sunday mornings to open doors and other related duties to

prepare for the day of worship. An easy to follow checklist will be provided. You and others would "take a turn" doing this very important Property ministry. Similar duties would follow the Sunday worship service (for example locking doors, checking the heat and air conditioning, etc). Again, an easy to follow checklist will be provided.

Both of these jobs would be a wonderful way to minister to the people of MPC by working in God's house. Please consider signing up for one or both of these new jobs on your "Time and Talents" sheets.

I'd also like to introduce an addition to the church Website. Now, on the list of menus on the left side of the website, you will find a menu called "Building and Ground Repairs".

If you notice something that needs to be brought to the attention of the Property Ministry click on that menu.

It will bring up a simple form to fill out.

That request will automatically be sent by email to the Property Chairman.

While this is still a "work in progress", this request, in addition to your time and talent survey, will allow us effectively pass along needs of the church to those willing and able to help out.

Under the Radar

This time, we consider a couple who have been deeply involved in MCP's life over the past decade, **Bill and Shirley Jackson**. Last summer, Bill's stroke placed some constraints on their involvement—drove him under the radar, if you will—but their interest in this congregation and its welfare have not diminished in any way. We are delighted to see improvement in Bill's condition and continue to pray for his full recovery.

The Jacksons hail from Mississippi—Bill from a rural farm, Shirley from the town of Clarksdale. Shirley calls Bill a “cradle Presbyterian” because his mother's loyalty was with that persuasion. Bill graduated from Mississippi State with a degree in animal husbandry; Shirley from Mississippi State College for women. Originally having met at a movie drive-in, they were married in the summer before Bill's senior year. After a 3-year stint in the Navy he was Assistant County Agent in Tupelo for several years. Following that he returned to the Navy and all told served for 22 years, retiring with the rank of Lieutenant Commander. His service in aviation intelligence put him often on aircraft carriers. His family (eventually four children) followed him around to assignments in Washington, DC, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, and eventually Virginia Beach, where he retired. There he began a second career as a church administrator at the Kempsville Presbyterian Church for five years. When their youngest child finished public school they moved to Hendersonville, NC, where they built a log home and volunteered in various capacities at Hendersonville's First Presbyterian Church. After 14 years there, arthritis in his knees made living in that home with its many steps impractical. They took a trip to Nova Scotia and on their way back were impressed by what they saw in Harrisonburg. Eventually they found a beautiful piece of property northeast of McGaheysville where they could build a home better suited to their needs. That's how they came to MPC, joining in 1997.

Bill served a 3-year term on the Session and was on, naturally, the Administrative Committee. In our church office there is now a volume called the MPC Policy Manual. It's the sort of handy reference a complex organization like ours needs to save its office staff and committees time—because someone has thought through answers to many questions that can be asked and problems that can arise. Guess what kind of training in administration evokes skill in drawing up such a manual? You're right—the military's kind of training. When MPC went through leadership transitions—George Conn to Ted Jones to John Leggett—volunteer Bill Jackson was giving the church excellent administrative leadership. He and Mary Elizabeth Thompson worked the Policy Manual into shape. Before his stroke, Bill would come into the office

for at least all of Monday morning each week. During a period when there was no pastor here, Bill and the Rev. Collier Harvey, who moderated the Session, helped the church as the de facto interim leadership team. For the most part, all this was under many people's radar, but MPC is better off today because of Bill's quiet, self-effacing service. Ask office manager Karen Leecy if you want confirmation of that.

Shirley grew up a Baptist, but for most of her married life has been involved in Presbyterian churches. She has also served a term on the Session here, serving on the Fellowship Committee and later in Christian Education. When her daughters were teenagers she sang in a chapel choir with them in Hawaii where Bill was stationed. Later, in Hendersonville, she learned to play handbells and still later became a member of our Crossroad Pealers bell choir. Much of Shirley's other work has been in the area of Christian Education, teaching Sunday School, or helping out in the kitchen or as a “shepherd” in Vacation Bible School. She helped significantly with the most recent pictorial directory. In MPC's Presbyterian Women she has held various posts; currently she is co-chair for the missions abroad concerns, which is now called “Together in Service,” and she belongs to the Shoshana Circle.

The Jacksons have been active in mission beyond their local church. Bill served a term on the local Habitat for Humanity's Board of Directors. Shirley for seven years has been an active volunteer with “People Helping People,” which assists people who have emergencies, need help with paying the rent, etc. This is an agency to which pastors can refer people in need and serves an important role in the community.

Perhaps the greatest legacy the Jacksons have given MPC has been their long-standing interest in small groups in the life of a congregation. This goes back many years and they participated in small group ministry in different churches. Around 2000 they began one group here, and in a few years there were four groups involving about 50 people meeting. Today one of these groups is still active. These groups provide deep fellowship and mutual support for their members.

When asked what their church experience had taught them, Shirley replied “the importance of a personal relationship with Christ.” In her Presbyterian churches she had found “more of a sense of a loving God than a governing God...there's not anything about us God isn't interested in.” Bill answered by saying “The importance of Scripture...God will not give you more than you can endure.” When asked what they value most about MPC, Bill said “the people and their concern for others, both inside and outside the church.” Shirley added, “the love, the concern, the fellowship, the closeness.” Praise God for these faithful servants, and continue to pray for Bill's restoration!

More from Kelly Miller . . .

By the time you read this Kelly will be making preparations to return to the states at the end of the month. Again, entries from her personal blog follow. Be on the lookout for a full feature on Kelly and her experience in a future issue.

Good Friday started quite early for me. Sleeping in a tent in Ikotos, I was awakened not only to rooster crowing only a few yards away but to the neighbor's radio playing nothing but static. After lying there a few minutes, I finally stepped out of my tent. Kennedy, our Ugandan friend with LWF (Lutheran World Federation), was supposed to pick us up at 6 am so we could proceed to Gulu...

Well, we didn't actually leave until about 10 am. (To those of you who hate delays, this is a typical travel day in Africa.) When word got out that there was a vehicle traveling to Uganda, there were more people that turned out to get a ride. We drove a Land Cruiser to Uganda. There were ten of us in the back on bench seats, and three in front (including the driver). Needless to say, it was a tight squeeze.

As we traveled on to Gulu from Kitgum, we passed so many IDP (Internally Displaced Persons) Camps. These camps were set up during the war in Uganda when the LRA (Lord's Resistant Army) was attacking the north. People fled from their homes to these camps and many of them are still living there. The camps were full of hundreds of tukels piled up on top of one another; there was barely any space between.

We finally reached Gulu in the late afternoon... [we stayed in] a guest house called Crete Mini Conference Center... Our room consisted of three sets of bunk beds crammed into a very small space. The bathroom was a full bathroom without running water. We had to dump water from a Jeri can into the toilet to flush it. (I believe that was the hardest shower/sponge bath I've ever taken!) . . .

Easter Sunday brought the rains. We went to Christ Church, an Anglican church... I had high hopes for this service, especially when they sang "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" and read from John about Christ's resurrection. (The AIC churches, at least in Sudan, don't really make a big deal about Easter so I was excited to attend an Easter service.) The bishop gave the sermon... At the

end of the 2 ½ hour service the bishop once again got up and addressed the people living in the IDP camps. He told them: "Go home! Go home! The war is over! Go home!" It was quite an interesting Easter service.

Tuesday was a travel day...and a waiting day.... By 10 am our stuff was in the vehicle and the driver was taking us to visit the Invisible Children office. After our tour... we were told we would be leaving around 11:30 am. . . . I was really anxious to get back to Sudan. [We did not leave on time so] we sped to Kitgum but by the time we got there it was too late to proceed to Sudan. The Sudan border would close at 5 pm and it was either sleep in Kitgum or sleep in the bush at the Sudan border. So, we stayed in Kitgum. We left the next day about mid-morning and made it back to Ikotos by 3. I had even more problems trying to get back to Torit but I finally made it back by Friday afternoon.

Our Gulu trip made for a nice holiday weekend and a nice break from Sudan, despite the few frustrations of travel. I am looking forward to seeing what the next few weeks will bring. . . Salaam Taaki!!
